IN THE NEWS

FUN President Bob Hurst received the ANA Medal of Merit. FUN Treasurer Tony Bonaro received the ANA Lawrence J Gentile Sr. Memorial Award for Outstanding Adult Advisor. FUN Topics Magazine received 1st Place for Best Regional Magazine, Joshua McMorrow-Hernandez editor.

There were 4 robberies at the ANA in Chicago, the largest being a <u>case</u> of Rolex watches, gold and cash taken off an unattended table on setup day. Apparently two men put the case on a flat cart under empty cases and went out the back door. How they got in or out, I don't know. I wasn't there and this is how the story was told to me.

The Heritage auction in conjunction with the ANA Show sold \$85,749,443. The highlight was the 1927-D \$20 Gold PCGS MS-66 at \$4.4 million. A 1793 B-3, C-3 Half Cent PCGS MS-66 BN CAC sold for just over \$1 million.
